HISTORIC PERCIVAL LANDING

PERCIVAL'S DOCK

Percival's Dock has played an important role in the maritime history of Olympia. Budd Inlet and Puget Sound. From 1860, when Captain Samuel W. Percival built a dock on Olympia's waterfront, the name Percival became synonymous with the era of steamboats in Budd Inlet. In 1877, Percival turned the wharf operation over to his son, 16-year-old John C. Percival. By 1891, Percival Dock had been rebuilt on the site along Water Street adjacent to the drawspan on the 4th Street bridge. The steamers found its modern facilities far more convenient than the old "long dock" they had previously used. Dredging also allowed more extensive use of the newer Percival Dock. Percival's Dock supplied wood and water for the steamers, served as the off-loading site for passengers and cargo, and was the ticketing agency for all lines coming into Olympia in the 20th century. The dock was sold in 1926 to Capt. F. E. Lovejoy, who operated Puget Sound Freight Lines. His ships replaced the steamers. Percival retained his office on the Olympia waterfront until his death in 1945. The dock was rebuilt many times over the years until it was torn down in 1977. Percival Landing Park was built at that time by the City of Olympia, commemorating the Percival legacy within the city's history.

2 RAIL BOAT WHARF AT PERCIVAL DOCK, Circa 1900
 In the 1920s and 1930s, there were over 20 tugboats loading and unloading coal and lumber logs to the main docks on the waterfront. By 1941, the big tugboat was the only commercial vessel built in Olympia and still in active service on Puget Sound.
 John Ross Clark had her built as a tug and passenger steamer. First operated in 1900, the picture shows her in her original service on the coast for both Olympia to Everett and Queen Anne straits. She was burned to the water's edge at Budd Dock in 1933 by a 10-ton concrete pile and was rebuilt as a steam tug, later being converted to diesel power.
